

Readings for the Birth of John the Baptist

1 Samuel 1:9-11 + 19b-22

Hannah rose after one such meal at Shiloh, and presented herself before the LORD; at the time Eli the priest was sitting on a chair near the doorpost of the LORD's temple. In her bitterness she prayed to the LORD, weeping freely, and made this vow: "O LORD of hosts, if you look with pity on the hardship of your servant, if you remember me and do not forget me, if you give your handmaid a male child, I will give him to the LORD all the days of his life. No razor shall ever touch his head." Elkanah had intercourse with his wife Hannah, and the LORD remembered her. She conceived and, at the end of her pregnancy, bore a son whom she named Samuel. "Because I asked the LORD for him." The next time her husband Elkanah was going up with the rest of his household to offer the customary sacrifice to the LORD and to fulfill his vows, Hannah did not go, explaining to her husband, "Once the child is weaned, I will take him to appear before the LORD and leave him there forever."

Galatians 4:21-5:1

Tell me, you who desire to be subject to the law, will you not listen to the law? For it is written that Abraham had two sons, one by a slave woman and the other by a free woman. One, the child of the slave, was born according to the flesh; the other, the child of the free woman, was born through the promise. Now this is an allegory: these women are two covenants. One woman, in fact, is Hagar, from Mount Sinai, bearing children for slavery. Now Hagar is Mount Sinai in Arabia and corresponds to the present Jerusalem, for she is in slavery with her children. But the other woman corresponds to the Jerusalem above; she is free, and she is our mother. For it is written, "Rejoice, you childless one, you who bear no children, burst into song and shout, you who endure no birth pangs; for the children of the desolate woman are more numerous than the children of the one who is married." Now you, my friends, are children of the promise, like Isaac. But just as at that time the child who was born according to the flesh persecuted the child who was born according to the Spirit, so it is now also. But what does the scripture say? "Drive out the slave and her child; for the child of the slave will not share the inheritance with the child of the free woman." So then, friends, we are children, not of the slave but of the free woman. For freedom Christ has set us free. Stand firm, therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery

Luke 1:57-66

Now the time came for Elizabeth to give birth, and she bore a son. Her neighbors and relatives heard that the Lord had shown his great mercy to her, and they rejoiced with her. On the eighth day they came to circumcise the child, and they were going to name him Zechariah after his father. But his mother said, "No; he is to be called John." They said to her, "None of your relatives has this name." Then they began motioning to his father to find out what name he wanted to give him. He asked for a writing tablet and wrote, "His name is John." And all of them were amazed. Immediately his mouth was opened and his tongue freed, and he began to speak, praising God. Fear came over all their neighbors, and all these things were talked about throughout the entire hill country of Judea. All who heard them pondered them and said, "What then will this child become?" For, indeed, the hand of the Lord was with him.

Do you know what the

FIRST SEVEN ECUMENICAL COUNCILS of the Church were?

Ecumenical councils are gatherings of the bishops of the universal (Catholic) Church, called to resolve major questions of faith, doctrine, and unity. Inspired by the Holy Spirit, these councils safeguard the truth of the Gospel and clarify the Church's teachings when confusion arises. The first seven ecumenical councils (4th–8th centuries) established the foundations of Christian belief on the

Trinity, the nature of Christ, and proper worship.

1. Council of Nicaea I (325 AD)

Teaching: Christ is fully divine, "of the same substance" as the Father.

Result: Creation of the Nicene Creed; condemnation of Arianism.

2. Council of Constantinople I (381 AD)

Teaching: Full divinity of the Holy Spirit; completion of Trinitarian doctrine.

Result: Expansion of the Creed into the version used today.



Teaching: Mary is Theotokos — "Mother of God."

Result: Condemnation of Nestorianism; affirmation of Christ's unity.

4. Council of Chalcedon (451 AD)

Teaching: Christ has two natures — divine and human — united in one Person.

Result: The Chalcedonian Definition, central to Christology.

5. Council of Constantinople II (553 AD)

Teaching: Reaffirmed Nicaea, Ephesus, and Chalcedon; clarified misunderstandings.

Result: Condemnation of writings incompatible with orthodox teaching.

6. Council of Constantinople III (680–681 AD)

Teaching: Christ has two wills, divine and human, working together. Result: Rejection of Monothelitism; defense of Christ's full humanity.

7. Council of Nicaea II (787 AD)

Teaching: Legitimate veneration of icons.

Result: Restoration of icons after the iconoclast controversy.

Why are these Councils so important?

These seven councils form the bedrock of Christian doctrine. They define who Jesus is, how God is revealed as Trinity, and how the Church worships in truth. Their teachings continue to shape our faith, liturgy, and spiritual life today.
