2 Tim 2:8-13

Remember Jesus Christ, raised from the dead, a descendant of David: such is my gospel, for which I am suffering, even to the point of chains, like a criminal. But the word of God is not chained. Therefore, I bear with everything for the sake of those who are chosen, so that they too may obtain the salvation that is in Christ Jesus, together with eternal glory. This saying is trustworthy: If we have died with him, we shall also live with him; if we persevere we shall also reign with him. But if we deny him, he will deny us. If we are unfaithful, he remains faithful, for he cannot deny himself. Praise be to God always.

Luke 24:13-35

Now that very day two of them were going to a village seven miles from Jerusalem called Emmaus, and they were conversing about all the things that had occurred. And it happened that while they were conversing and debating, Jesus himself drew near and walked with them, but their eyes were prevented from recognizing him. He asked them, "What are you discussing as you walk along?" They stopped, looking downcast. One of them, named Cleopas, said to him in reply, "Are you the only visitor to Jerusalem who does not know of the things that have taken place there in these days?" And he replied to them, "What sort of things?" They said to him, "The things that happened to Jesus the Nazarene, who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, how our chief priests and rulers both handed him over to a sentence of death and crucified him. But we were hoping that he would be the one to redeem Israel; and besides all this, it is now the third day since this took place. Some women from our group, however, have astounded us: they were at the tomb early in the morning and did not find his body; they came back and reported that they had indeed seen a vision of angels who announced that he was alive. Then some of those with us went to the tomb and found things just as the women had described, but him they did not see." And he said to them, "Oh, how foolish you are! How slow of heart to believe all that the prophets spoke! Was it not necessary that the Messiah should suffer these things and enter into his glory?" Then beginning with Moses and all the prophets, he interpreted to them what referred to him in all the scriptures. As they approached the village to which they were going, he gave the impression that he was going on farther. But they urged him, "Stay with us, for it is nearly evening and the day is almost over." So he went in to stay with them. And it happened that, while he was with them at table, he took bread, said the blessing, broke

it, and gave it to them. With that their eyes were opened and they recognized him, but he vanished from their sight. Then they said to each other, "Were not our hearts burning (within us) while he spoke to us on the way and opened the scriptures to us?" So they set out at once and returned to Jerusalem where they found gathered together the eleven and those with them who were saying, "The Lord has truly been raised and has appeared to Simon!" Then the two recounted what had taken place on the way and how he was made known to them in the breaking of the bread.

Saint George

is known for his bravery, courage, and *unwavering commitment to Christ*, and his life serves as a powerful example for all of us to follow.

There are several **important lessons** that can be learned from the disciples encountering Jesus on the road to Emmaus. **Here are three**:

1- Jesus is with us even when we do not recognize him: The two disciples on the road to Emmaus did not recognize Jesus, yet he walked with them, talked with them, and taught them. We too may not always recognize Jesus in our midst, but he is with us every step of the way, guiding us and l eading us to a deeper understanding of his love and grace.

2- Scripture reveals Jesus to us: As Jesus walked with the two disciples, he opened the Scriptures to them and helped them to understand the meaning of what had happened. Scripture is a powerful tool for helping us to understand who Jesus is and what he has done for us.

3- Jesus reveals himself to us in the breaking of the bread: When Jesus sat down to eat with the two disciples, he took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to them. This act of breaking the bread is a powerful symbol of the Eucharist, where we remember Jesus' sacrifice and are reminded of his presence with us.
