


Ex 17: 8-15

Then Amalek came and waged war against Israel in Rephidim. So Moses said to Joshua, "Choose some men for us, and tomorrow go out and engage Amalek in battle. I will be standing on top of the hill with the staff of God in my hand." Joshua did as Moses told him: he engaged Amalek in battle while Moses, Aaron, and Hur climbed to the top of the hill. As long as Moses kept his hands raised up, Israel had the better of the fight, but when he let his hands rest, Amalek had the better of the fight. Moses' hands, however, grew tired; so they took a rock and put it under him and he sat on it.

Meanwhile Aaron and Hur supported his hands, one on one side and one on the other, so that his hands remained steady until sunset. And Joshua defeated Amalek and his people with the sword. Then the LORD said to Moses: Write this down in a book as something to be remembered, and recite it to Joshua: I will completely blot out the memory of Amalek from under the heavens. Moses built an altar there, which he named Yahweh-nissi (the Banner of the Lord).

1 Corinthians 1:18-25

The message of the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. For it is written: "I will destroy the wisdom of the wise, and the learning of the learned I will set aside." Where is the wise one? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made the wisdom of the world foolish? For since in the wisdom of



God the world did not come to know God through wisdom, it was the will of God through the foolishness of the proclamation to save those who have faith. For Jews demand signs and Greeks look for wisdom, but we proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, but to those who are called, Jews and Greeks alike, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. For the foolishness of God is wiser than human wisdom, and the weakness of God is stronger than human strength.

John 12:20-32

Now there were some Greeks among those who had come up to worship at the feast. They came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, and asked him, "Sir, we would like to see Jesus." Philip went and told Andrew; then Andrew and Philip went and told Jesus. Jesus answered them, "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. Amen, amen, I say to you, unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains just a grain of wheat; but if it dies, it produces much fruit. Whoever loves his life loses it, and whoever hates his life in this world will preserve it for eternal life. Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there also will my servant be. The Father will honor whoever serves me. "I am troubled now. Yet what should I say? 'Father, save me from this hour'? But it was for this purpose that I came to this hour. Father, glorify your name." Then a voice came from heaven, "I have glorified it and will glorify it again." The crowd there heard it and said it was thunder; but others said, "An angel has spoken to him." Jesus answered and said, "This voice did not come for my sake but for yours. Now is the time of judgment on this world; now the ruler of this world will be driven out. And when I am lifted up from the earth, I will draw everyone to myself."



The Cross of our Lord Jesus Christ holds profound and central lessons in Christianity. Here are ten lessons we may draw from the Cross of Christ:

1. **Salvation through Sacrifice**: The Cross symbolizes Jesus' ultimate sacrifice for the forgiveness of humanity's sins. It teaches that through His death on the Cross, Jesus made salvation possible for all who believe in Him. This sacrifice emphasizes the importance of God's grace and the redemption of sinners.

- 2. **Unconditional Love**: The Cross is a powerful demonstration of God's unconditional love for all of us. Jesus willingly endured crucifixion out of love for humanity, showing that God's love transcends human imperfections and sins. This love serves as a model for how Christians should love one another.
- 3. **Forgiveness and Reconciliation**: The Cross teaches the importance of forgiveness and reconciliation. Jesus' words, "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they

do" (Luke 23:34), illustrate His call to forgive others, even in the face of great suffering and injustice. It encourages us to seek reconciliation and healing in our relationships.

- 9. **Faith and Trust**: The Cross challenges Christians to place their faith and trust in God, even in the face of seemingly insurmountable challenges. It teaches that God's plan may not always align with human expectations, but His purposes are ultimately for the greater good.
- 10. **The Cost of Discipleship**: The Cross reminds believers of the cost of discipleship. Following Jesus may involve self-denial and carrying one's own cross (Matthew 16:24). It calls Christians to live lives of faith and obedience, even when it requires personal sacrifice.
